The NCCVEH creates a public health infrastructure that promotes a comprehensive system of vision care and eye health for all children.

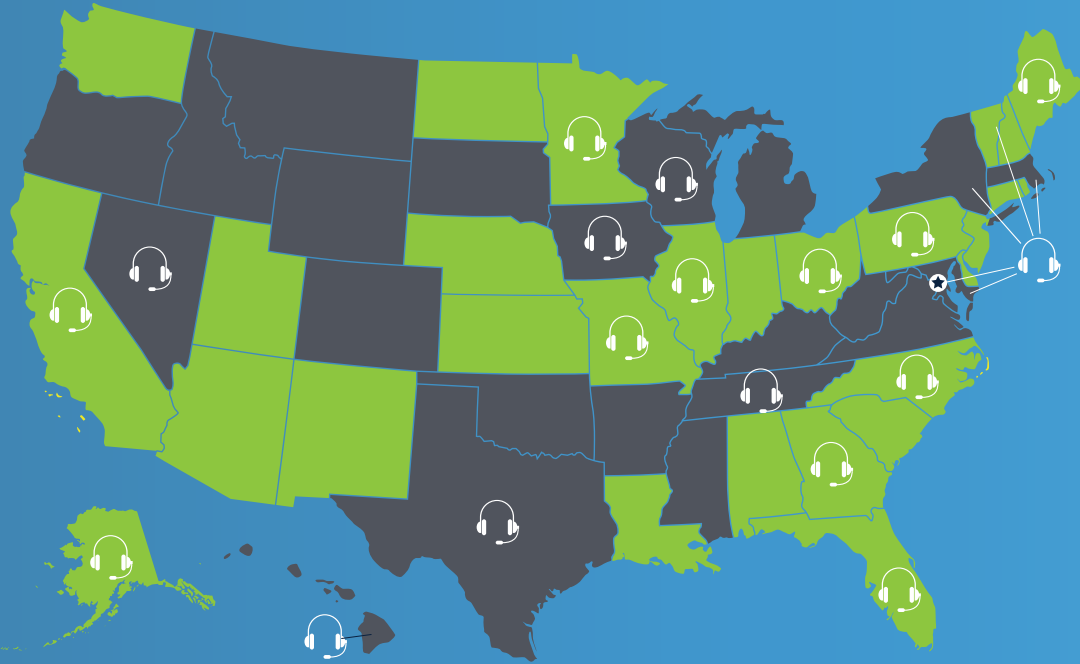
The NCCVEH adopted 3 goals to guide our work in 2023 and 2024:

Goal 1: Convene a diverse group of multi-disciplinary stakeholders to partner in efforts to promote and improve eye health and vision care equity and effective children's vision and eye health systems. Sectors include healthcare, education, early childhood care and education, public health, and families.

Goal 2: Increase adoption of NCCVEH guidance, data, and measures of accountability to ensure eye health equity and an evidence base for children's vision and eye health policies and practices in communities, states, and nationally.

Goal 3: Increase adoption of evidence-based practices through the creation and delivery of educational programming, training, resources, and technical assistance to families; professionals in communities, states, and U.S. territories; national organizations; federal agencies and tribal programs.

ACHIEVEMENTS



Children's Vision Screening Certification Course

- 408 total certified by national office and 6,173 certified by Prevent Blindness Affiliates
- Learners from 28 states + DC
- Number of children screened by learners trained by National office = 229,576 and 1,436,869 by the Prevent Blindness Affiliates
- 18 groups of learners were certified

Technical Assistance

- 50 requests from 21 states + DC, 7 national organizations and 4 international organizations

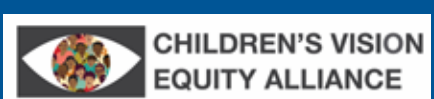

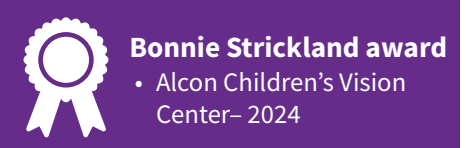

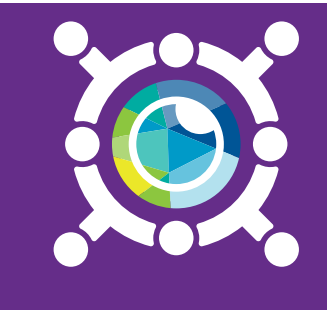
Presentation Highlights
