



ALBERT AND ETHEL HERZSTEIN CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

For over a decade, the Albert and Ethel Herzstein Charitable Foundation has served as a cornerstone for the expansion for both our children and adult programs and services in the Greater Houston Area. UNITED WAY GREATER HOUSTON

Prevent Blindness Texas has been working with United Way Greater Houston for the past three years to create new opportunities for individuals and families in the Greater Houston community to thrive. Since the inception of our partnership, PBT has screened and educated more than 2,600 adults at risk of vision loss. This opportunity has challenged PBT to develop more diverse partners to better meet client needs in real-time and support our partners to create an experience that is client-driven and accessible. It is partners such as United Way Greater Houston that help cultivate growth for PBT to improve delivery of care to families across the Greater Houston area!

NORTH EAST ISD

School districts, teachers, students, and families in San Antonio prepared to have their eyes on the sky for two solar eclipses during the academic school year 23-24. To better prepare, the North East ISD (NEISD) Family Engagement team partnered with Prevent Blindness Texas (PBT) to turn the excitement around solar eclipses into teachable moments. Many families would also take advantage of the opportunity to experience the eclipses with their children and families outside of school; therefore, NEISD invited PBT to



conduct several virtual presentations to help families understand the importance of vision health and safety and how to safely view the eclipse. With a goal to ensure continuous learning for their students and families, NEISD also invited PBT to provide education and resources on children's eye health and safety to be available for all NEISD Title 1 campuses. Together, we are supporting an environment of health and wellness through educational development.

SAN JOSE CLINIC

Our partnership with San Jose Clinic has enhanced access to vision care and resources in Fort Bend County.

According to Areli Estrada, Clinic Operations Supervisor, many individuals served through our efforts are receiving eye care for the first time. Through this collaboration, we have conducted numerous vision screenings, identifying vision issues early and connecting individuals with the follow-up care. By providing these screenings and resources, we have helped improve health outcomes for the community. This partnership represents our shared mission to addressing healthcare disparities and supporting the well-being of the Fort Bend community.
